Morning session - Perspectives: 10:00-12:30

What perspectives are heard and amplified? And what are the voices that fall outside the norm and need space to grow the most?

For this morning, we changed the traditional format of presentation into a round space of exchange. In small groups moderated by women artists, directors, and decision-makers we will sit with what they bring to the table, a perspective that is near and dear to them.

Table topics and moderators

1. **Devotion**: the existential fire behind your work in the arts. How strongly can it burn, and for whom? How do society and the art world react to it?



Andrea Voets is the artistic director of Resonate Productions. She makes musical journalism by combining in-depth social journalism with lots of original music. 2024 brings FOR REAL: a lauded theatrical radio show on human dignity, starting from an analysis of the intellectual undermining of women. Previous projects are Millennial History (Best of Human Interest Radio, AIB, and Best Podcasts of 2022, Avery Trufelman), While We Live (Best of Classical Music 2020,

NRC) and Wings & Roots. Andrea writes for De Groene Amsterdammer and is undertaking a worldwide search into the question 'how to feel safe', with the support of the selective Dutch grant FastForward. The home-base of Resonate Productions is De Balie in Amsterdam, the main house for debate of the Netherlands, and Festival van Vlaanderen Mechelen in Belgium.

2. **Collectivity in art:** What does collectivity mean to you? How do you relate to hierarchy? And does the structure of your organization influence your artistic expression?



Joske Koning is an actress, theater maker, writer and singer (Maastricht Theater Academy (2011) and T.I.M.E., the master's degree in musical theater by the Veenfabriek and the Royal Conservatory (2014). With King Sisters, the collective she created with her sisters Annelie and Marthe Koning, she makes personal transdisciplinary musical theater. 2024 Close to Harmony is about the search for, and the limits of, intimacy. She previously created Rebuilding a Voice in which they rebuilt the female voice; Talking Songs (in the language program Spr!tzl by Silbersee) and Song of the Sisters. (Best of Fringe Award). King Sisters will be affiliated with Festival Cement, Via Zuid, PLAN Brabant, Muziektheater Transparant and O. Rotterdam for the next two years.

3. From an artist perspective – How to develop a female vocabulary in opera?

Classic source material always leads to a problematic representation of women on stage. Female roles are cornered and represented with the 'standard' and very limited palette of archetypes. How can we break free of what has been dictated for decades? How do we ALL feel included and are able to deeply connect with the characters on stage in the opera productions we create today?

Jorinde Keesmaat is a Dutch director of opera and staged classical concerts. From 2016 through 2019, she was Guest Director in Residence at the Center for Contemporary Opera in New York. From 2020 to 2022, Jorinde was appointed to the same position at National Sawdust in Brooklyn. Currently, she is Director in Residence at the Muziekgebouw aan 't IJ in Amsterdam. In her immersive multidisciplinary work, Keesmaat plays with the relationship



between spectator and actor/musician, and boundaries between classical concerts, opera, and theater. She is known for her modern approach towards the art form and is specialized in creating opera from scratch.

4. A visionary composer by nature and nurture: how to move and feel free in a space where you're under-represented? What do we bring ourselves into these creative processes from the strength gain out of the (self-)awareness of being seen or heard and use use it as a part of our vision as a composer in the collective process?



Eva van Manen is a Dutch artist, poet, theater maker, music composer and producer. This year, she will take part in O. Festival with her own theatrical concert, combining compositions and poetry. Beside that, Eva composes music for Dutch theater companies like Theater Rotterdam and the National Theater. Next to her own work, Eva van Manen is the co-founder of the rosetta.beats. - a platform for female and gender non-conforming music producers and composers in the Netherlands. She graduated in 2011 at the Amsterdam Theatre School and Performing Arts Academy. (ATD Amsterdam, Netherlands).

5. Bushra El-Turk will both moderate a table and present her work at WOMAN AT POINT ZERO (MTNow competition winner) - a multimedia opera about emancipation, inspired by the book of the Egyptian author and feminist Nawal El Saadawi.

Bushra El-Turk was born in London and has written over 60 works for the concert hall, the stage, film, TV and live art performance. Her work is often defined by the integration of music and musicians from different cultural traditions, and the compulsion to highlight and challenge socio-cultural issues. Her works blur written and improvisational elements, forbearing the influence of her Lebanese roots all the while leaning towards the theatrical. creating works that are '...ironic...', '...arresting...' She is responsible for the programming and producing of productions in the Linbury Theatre, and for producing Royal Opera productions away from Covent Garden at venues such as Shakespeare's Globe and the Roundhouse. Highlights of her career in Covent Garden include overseeing the world premieres of Mark Anthony Turnage's *Coraline* at the Barbican, Philip Venables' *4.48 Psychosis* and Oliver Leith's *Last Days*. She is also responsible for The Royal Opera's research and development programme,



which supports the development of new work and emerging artists. Sarah joined The Royal Opera as a Senior Producer in April 2015.

Sarah will share about <u>Engender</u>, the Royal Opera's initiative to address gender imbalance in opera and music theatre and drive towards gender equity in all areas of the opera field.

Halleluja by Fleur Khani & the Khani Foundation

Fleur Khani is a musician, music performance maker and collective collaborator. Her practice centres around voice, music and physicality in theatre and performance, and is fundamentally polyphonic and community based. Khani studied Dramatic Arts at the Royal conservatory in Antwerp and at a.pass (Advanced Performance and Scenography Studies) in Brussels. In 2023 Khani created her first big theatre work Halleluja - a vocal theatre piece that gathers 28 local people to create a jubilee feast of joy. It premiered in May 2023 in Antwerp. Halleuja will be touring throughout 2024 and 2025.

Mees Vervuurt (2000) is a composer & director, creating transdisciplinary site-specific music performances. In 2022 he graduated from BA Music & Performance Art at Utrecht Conservatory with Honours in Composition, and studied at the Alternative Conservatoire in London (2024). His works are transdisciplinary: image, movement, music and location intertwine in poetical and stilling worlds in which the audience disappears for a while. His most recent, highly praised and reviewed works VACUÜM (2023), STABAT MATER (2022) and 'Sometimes I visualize myself back in the belly of my mother' (2021) are characteristic for their site-specific, ambiguous and breathtaking character.

Hooligan Art Community is a group of artists from Ukraine, the UK and Germany, founded in Kiev in 2019. They create site-specific interdisciplinary performances rooted in theatre, music and film. Their work takes place in non-theatre spaces and creates meeting places between artists and audiences. This year, the Hooligan Art Community is artist-in-residence at O., where they research and develop material for a future performance about the power of the masses on the individual. Janneke van der Putten is a Rotterdam-based artist holding a BDes in TXT (Textile), Gerrit Rietveld Academy (Amsterdam, 2009), and a MMus in Artistic Research, Royal Academy of Art & Royal Conservatoire (The Hague, 2013). In 2023 her solo album '*JNNK*' was released on vinyl and featured in The Wire with an article by Abi Bliss. That same year, Janneke's long-term research 'Cycles' about the day and night rhythm was supported by CBK Rotterdam. Together with composer Sajjra Xhrs Galarreta, she is currently preparing a new music publication of their project 'Invisible Architecture', recorded in a water reservoir.



Paul Boereboom is a scenographer living in Amsterdam. He studied scenography at the

Amsterdam School of the Arts. After having been on stage for a long time, Paul decided to no longer question space (on stage) with his body, but as a designer. His work includes theatre design, installations and costume design, as well as video design and work in virtual reality.

Leon Rogissart (1995) is a Belgian theatre director. He graduated from the directing course of the Academy for Theater and

Dance in Amsterdam in 2021. For him, the theatre is the ultimate place to create a collective experience where intuition and resonance prevail. In addition to theatre, music and Virtual Reality (VR), these are also important pillars in his work. The combination of the three gives him, as a director, the opportunity to unravel abstraction in reality and to deconstruct the concept of time. In 2021, Leon, together with his colleague Paul Boereboom, received the award for best VR production at the KABOOMFestival in Utrecht with the VR prototype 'Ascension'.

They will present Conversations with the Inner, a musical theatre ritual combining VR technology and live performance; a participatory meeting for eighty people in which current themes such as self-reflection and inner dialogue are discussed.







Maria Fusco is a working-class writer and director born in Belfast, Northern Ireland. She is Professor of Interdisciplinary Writing at the University of Dundee, Scotland. She works across performance and theory and her award-winning works are translated into ten languages. She co-directed MTNow selected Film Opera *History of the Present* with artist-filmmaker Margaret Salmon.

Maria will discuss what is at stake in interdisciplinary working, focussing on the experimental, embodied socio-political voice.

David T. Little A natural musical storyteller with "a knack for overturning musical conventions" (The New York Times), composer David T. Little is known for stage, concert, and screen works permeated with the power of the unexpected. Little's broad catalog speaks to the mix of light and dark that we experience in life, unafraid to invoke the mythical, bewitching, disturbing, surreal, or comedic. His new work Black Lodge was nominated for Best Opera Recording in the 2024 GRAMMY® Awards.



David T. Little has drawn acclaim for operas including Dog Days, JFK, and the comedy Vinkensport, or The Finch Opera (all with libretto by Royce Vavrek), as well as his GRAMMY-nominated opera, Soldier

Songs. Little's **Black Lodge**, a metal-infused opera with a libretto by poet Anne Waldman, was premiered by Beth Morrison Projects at Opera Philadelphia, with a soundtrack released by Cantaloupe Music. Upcoming and recent projects include the world premiere of SIN-EATER by The Crossing at Penn Live Arts; monodrama What Belongs to You, developed for tenor Karim Sulayman and Alarm Will Sound; and a commission from the Metropolitan Opera / Lincoln Center Theater New Works Program. Little's music is published by Boosey & Hawkes.

Rebekka Sofie Bohse Meyer is the artistic director of Jakobe Performing Arts. The company creates and produces immersive and experimenting performances with sound and new technology. With her musical background, sound lies at the core of her work, having worked with spatial sound, generative sound and sounds for A.I. This has further led to her interest in new technology and research into the immersive qualities of virtual reality. Recently, she has combined sound, performance and new technology into the VR opera MORTALITIES in a new opera format, inspired by necroaesthetic. Furthermore, Bohse Meyer curates the interdisciplinary and performative exhibition space platform BUNKER in Copenhagen, Denmark. Her new work explores LARP and gaming for opera & music experiences.

Sigrún Gyða Sveinsdóttir, originally from Iceland, holds a BA in Fine Arts from the Iceland Academy of the Arts and an MA in Fine Arts and Design from the Sandberg Instituut in Amsterdam. Trained in classical singing, she mixes opera and visual arts to subvert traditional operatic norms, focusing on socially engaged themes such as gender inequality and societal issues. Founder of the performance group TTS, Sigrún produces innovative stage works that incorporate extensive bodily movement and visual narratives. Notable among her projects is the operetta HLAUPA, presented in Amsterdam in 2021, which demonstrated her interdisciplinary approach.



In her presentation, Sigrún will discuss her earlier work as a

visual artist and stage director, culminating in her current opera, Skjóta, to debut during Reykjavik's Arts Festival in June 2024. Drawing upon her background in conceptual performance art and classical singing, she founded the performance group TTS, dedicated to developing stage works and operas that predominantly feature female and non-binary individuals, both on stage and behind the scenes.

Stacie Dunlop is a multi-hyphenate artist. Focusing on the reimagining of performative work in a collaborative, process-driven way, she is inspired by the cross-pollination of contemporary opera, contemporary circus, and contemporary theatre. Her creative process begins with the goal of reimagining an existing work, and revisioning that work into a new form by taking a thought/dream/vision and animating it. The Lonely Child Project is her current collaborative focus with contemporary circus artists Angola Murdoch and Holly Treddenick. Her next focus, Letters, in collaboration with composer Frank Horvat, is a multi-disciplinary music theatre work spanning the bridges

between theatre and opera.

Stacie will share the challenges and possibilities of a creative capture vs a chronological capture and the challenges and magic of bringing a work onto the stage that has not been fully realized.
